WILLIAM G. CHALMERS D. D.

He was born March 8, 1922 in Hamilton, Ohio. In 1944 he graduated from Los Angeles Bible Theological Seminary with a B. Th. degree. He received his B. A. degree in 1946 from Whitworth College, Spokane, Washington. In 1949 he received his Master's degree from Princeton University. Schillen College, Kleiningersheim, Germany awarded him an L.H.D. honorary degree in 1967. And in 1968 Whitworth College awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. He served as pastor of the Salem-Zion Churches in 1949-1950. Other pastorates include First Presbyterian, Ashland, Ohio 1950-1954; Magnolia Presbyterian, Seattle, Washington 1956-1964; Area Counselor — the 50 Million Fund, Oregon and Missouri, 1965-1967; President of University of Dubuque, Dubuque, Iowa, 1967-1970. He now serves the First Presbyterian Church, Danville, Illinois.

ELLIS LLOYD

He was born July 11, 1893 in Penycae, North Wales. He received his education in Wales. His first call to the ministry was to Montreal, Canada. He also served pastorates in Nanticoke, Pennsylvania; New York Mills, New York; Granville, New York, and Cleveland, Ohio. He served the Salem-Zion Churches, Venedocia, Ohio from 1951-1962, at which time he retired. He continued to be a member of Maumee Valley Presbytery after retirement. The Rev. Lloyd passed away August 13, 1967.

JAMES G. PATTERSON

He was born July 5, 1924 in Walton New York. He attended Union College toward a B. S. degree in Physics, leaving after two and one-half years to serve two years in the U. S. Navy as a ETM s/c in Electronics. In 1948 he graduated from Muskingum College with a B. S. degree in Chemistry. From Pittsburgh-Xenia Seminary in 1951, he received his B. D. degree. From the same College he received his Th. M. degree in 1955. He has held pastorates in New Alexandria, Pennsylvania, 1951-1955; Bellefontaine, Ohio 1955-1963; Salem-Zion Churches, Venedocia, Ohio, 1963-1968 and The Federated Church, Waterford, New York which he serves at the present time.

GEORGE W. WITMER

He was born in Oil City, Pennsylvania, February 27, 1929. His undergraduate work was completed at Youngstown State University, graduating in 1962 with a B. A. degree. He attended Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, 1962-1964. In 1967 he received his Master Divinity degree from Anderson Graduate School of Theology. He was ordained into the Christian ministry on February 28, 1968 at Servia, Indiana. Mr. Witmer began his ministry with the Salem-Zion Churches in Venedocia, Ohio, June 13, 1969 and served these Churches until May 31, 1973. He is presently serving the First Presbyterian Church, Jackson, Ohio.

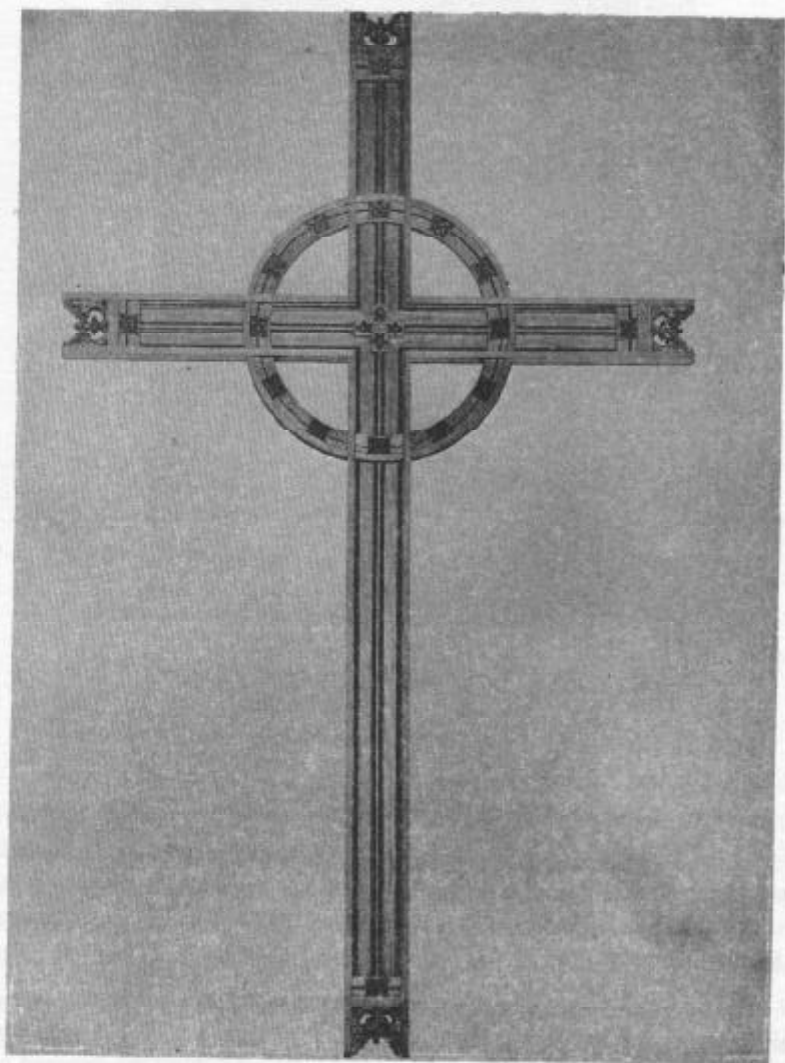
THE ORGAN

The instrument at Salem United Presbyterian Church, Venedocia, Ohio is a 19 rank pipe organ built by M. P. Moller, Inc. of Hagerstown, Maryland and is identified as Opus 10711. The instrument was designed by Mr. Jack Staley of the Moller Company.

The instrument is divided into three divisions known as the Great Organ, Swell Organ, and Pedal Organ. Pipes of the Great Organ and Pedal Organ are exposed while the pipes of the Swell Organ are enclosed behind the exposed pipe-work.

The original 1898 Barckhoff Pipe Organ of 14 ranks was removed on November 5, 1970.

Installation and tonal finishing of this Moller Pipe Organ was accomplished by Burger and Shafer Organ Company, Findlay, Ohio.



THE CHANCEL CROSS

The Cross is the generally accepted emblem of Christianity. The various parts of the Cross symbolize Christ surrounded by His Apostles, Evangelists and the emblems of His dignity.

The small Cross in the center is taken to represent Christ himself. The four rosettes at the ends stand for the Four Evangelists who wrote the Gospels. The circle is the emblem of eternity and also forms a nimbus which is the emblem of the glory and holiness of God.

The twelve rosettes on the circle of the Cross represent The Twelve Apostles. The Crown at the end of each tip of the Cross represents the Kingship of Christ as well as the crown of life that is promised to the faithful.

The interpenetration of the circle and the Cross show that eternity extends to us through the Cross and the eternal effect of the redemption secured on the Cross by the death of Jesus Christ. Likewise, the Cross penetrates throughout all eternity.

The small Cross in the exact center of the circle shows that Jesus Christ is at the center of the world, the universe, and all of the divine creation.



In November of 1964, a gift of 25 Schulmerich cast-bronze handbells were given to Salem Church in the memory of Thomas A. Morgan by his family. Rev. James Patterson, along with his wife, started the first group of ringers. In September of 1965, Mrs. Bebb Jones took over the leadership and direction of the handbell choirs. At that time there were 16 ringers in two groups; eight ladies (Mary Evans, Jean Owens, Becky Zirkle, Mary Patterson, Marcile Lare, Doris Price, Violet Ashton and Evelyn Pugh) and eight youth (Mary Ann Owens, Elgarda Evans, Eugenia Evans, Judy Jones, Sharon Davis, Cheryl Patterson, Karen Koenig and Sandra Richards). Rev. Patterson built a set of tables and boxes for transport and the bell groups began to travel. This began a run of public appearances which were to grow into an unexpected opportunity for Christian witness. In the fall of 1969 an additional 13 bells were given by Mr. and Mrs. Layton Jenkins in memory of both their parents, making a total of 38 bells covering a three-octave range. From December 1965 through May 1972, 30 youth and 20 adults participated in the bell programs which, in addition to playing regularly in church, spread the mission of the bells over 9,000 miles reaching approximately 20,000 people (excluding radio and TV audiences).
